Bruce N. Freeman was a State Representative from Chelmsford from 1969 until his death in 1986. He championed the cause of the Lowell-Sudbury Rail Trail in the State Legislature starting in 1985. Bruce Freeman was inspired in this cause by the Cape Cod Rail Trail in MA and the Coyote Creek Bike Trail in Hellyer Park, San Jose, CA.

About the Trail

The Bruce Freeman Rail Trail (BFRT) follows the old New Haven Railroad Framingham & Lowell Line.

Phase 1 (6.8 miles in Lowell, Chelmsford and Westford) opened in 2009.

Phase 2A (4.9 miles in Westford, Carlisle and Acton) opened in spring 2018.

Phase 2B (Approx. 0.8 miles: Bridge over Rte. 2) is currently being designed.

Phase 2C (3.0 miles in Concord) is scheduled to open in spring 2019.

Phase 2D (4.5 miles in Sudbury) is currently being designed.

Phase 3 (4.8 miles in Sudbury and Framingham) Right of way is still owned by the railroad company CSX.

The Friends is a non-profit organization working in partnership with state and local governments toward completion of the rail trail. This 100% volunteer group is active in resolving the state and federal issues associated with planning, design, construction, and maintenance of the rail trail; ensuring access and connection to the BFRT and promoting the use and enjoyment of the trail.


