Fire Chief Appointed to NERAC

Chief Tom Judge has recently been appointed to serve on the Northeast Homeland Security Regional Advisory Council. NERAC includes 85 communities in northeastern Massachusetts.

The NERAC Council is a 16-member body with representatives from the law enforcement, fire service, emergency management, public health, healthcare, emergency medical services, public safety communications, government administration, corrections, and transportation disciplines. There are two fire service representatives on the council, and Chief Judge is replacing Lincoln Fire Chief Steve Carter who is stepping down; the other fire service member is Lawrence Fire Chief Brian Moriarty.

The Council is responsible for enhancing the ability of the region to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terror and other disasters that affect the safety of the public by carrying out the strategies and objectives defined by the Massachusetts State Homeland Security Strategy and the National Preparedness Goal. The Council also serves as a forum to promote regional, interdisciplinary collaboration and idea sharing that makes public safety efforts more efficient and effective.
